# **PINK NOISE: FLEXING THE FREQUENCY**

CURATED BY SARAH MICHELLE RUPERT

**Pink Noise: Flexing the Frequency demonstrates the prevalence of the feminine association of the color pink in contemporary art and life. Curated by Sarah Michelle Rupert, works by contemporary artists in the collection of Francie Bishop Good and David Horvitz and beyond embody the current ambivalence about pink, either embracing it and amplifying its message or rejecting it as limiting, outdated and trite.**

**In Pink Noise, female artists flex their collective muscle along that narrow rose-hued continuum - morphing and contorting, expanding and evolving assumed notions of femininity and a “female style”. The artists in Pink Noise produce works in a diverse range of media: photography, painting, performance, fiber art, drawing and sculpture.**

**The more than 30 artists re-define traditionally “female” topics such as motherhood, performance, identity and objectification with a skeptical and discerning eye; and take on new topics once considered outside the female domain. Having witnessed successive waves of feminism, artists are now breaking and bending rules as to taboo topics, subjects, and behaviors expected of them.**

**They are refusing limitations once assumed to be the constricted purview of women artists.**

**They are subverting stereotypes and expectations and creating an openness previously disallowed for women, and the color pink.**



**KERRY PHILLIPS**

A ground breaking artist, the work of Elizabeth Murray twists, contorts and challenges formal norms of painting with jutting shapes and three dimensional forms that push against the status quo. As she plays with macabre, cartoonish figures, her layered, mixed media process and bold swaths of color evoke a nightmarish quality that is as unsettling as it is humorous.

Shiela Levrant de Bretteville was a founder of the Women's Design Program at the California Institute of the Arts, Valencia and later cofounded the historic public space, The Woman's Building, with Judy Chicago and Arlene Raven in 1973. The same year, de Bretteville launched Pink, a collaborative project in which she asked various artists across the country to submit responses exploring their association with the color pink. With a background in graphic design, marketing and art, the artist recognized a problematic thread in the commercialization of the color.

Artist, author, illustrator and designer Maira Kalman's work narrates everyday life with a quirky attention to detail and respect for the seemingly mundane. She has said of her hopeful legacy: "A joy of living, despite tragedy". Her work continues to grow and reach into other disciplines and media, from books to theatrical performances and choreography.

"I'm probably doing too much, which is a New York syndrome—I should write a book called *One Thing at a Time*. Of course everybody confronts that; we have a limited amount of energy in this world—what will we do with it?"



**KATE GILMORE**

Working between mediums of photography, performance, video and sculpture, Kate Gilmore's work explores themes of female identity and gender power dynamics, visualized and performed through elaborate, metaphorical constructions. Created from a performance at The Weatherspoon Art Museum in Greensboro North Carolina, "Wall Bearer" transforms these six uniformed women into structural elements, objects of support. Uniformly dressed in a sweet hot pink, triggering simultaneous Pepto-Bismol memories of queasiness and relief, the women stood perfectly still for three hour stretches during the performance as visitors explored the space.

"I would say that I am more of an abstract thinker . . . I take ideas or experiences, not necessarily specifics, and abstract them. I think this allows an audience to relate to my work on a personal level and, hopefully, they are able to bring their own experiences into the pieces."



### LISA YUSKAVAGE

Deliberately provocative, the work of Lisa Yuskavage has long been controversial for its voluptuous subjects and objectifying manner of representation. Inspired by a mix of her own imagination, Disney animations and pornography, Yuskavage's paradoxical pictorial world is populated by buxom, nubile young women in various states of undress, frolicking in a misty, dream-like landscape, often shown as very aware of the viewer's gaze.



### PORTIA MUNSON

Since 1994, Portia Munson has been creating large installations of discarded pink objects, carefully arranged and photographed, under the series "Pink Project". Her objects range in size and functionality but persist in their shared consumer target – women and girls. These overwhelming and disorienting images lump together disparate objects of contemporary consumption – combs, cleaning products, guns, pacifiers, dildos, toys, salad tongs – defined by their assumed appeal to women based on a superficial, pandering and naïve association of the color pink.

**"Each iteration of the work has revealed the marketing of femininity and the infantilization of the female gender while also exploring the culturally loaded color pink and its continued societal projection onto girls and women."**

A former child contestant herself, Colby Katz photographs the controversial world of child beauty pageants in her continuing pursuit of the exploration of American subcultures. Sharing a glimpse of the rituals, personalities and awkward realities behind the scenes of these glamour parades, Katz's photographs are endearing, humanizing and at times agonizing portraits. Her prints follow a documentary lineage, however employ a criticality common to contemporary art often using exaggerated proportion between her subjects, their mothers and the towering, intricate structures of trophies, make-up kits and costumes.



### PEGGY LEVISON NOLAN

Peggy Levison Nolan is a self-taught photographer whose focus narrows in on the everyday objects and scenes one finds in many a middle class home and lives. Finding inspiration in her own family, her work poetically and quietly highlights the moments of our lives that string together our collective domestic existence.



### BRENDA ANN KEANNEALLY

Brenda Ann Keanneally's multi-layered project "Upstate Girls" follows the lives of a handful of young women growing up in the struggling industrial town of Troy, NY, the artist's hometown. Keanneally follows her subjects' troubled lives as they navigate economic hardships, legal troubles, drug abuse and teen pregnancy; many issues of which resonate personally with the artist. Revealing the enormous power of the cycle of poverty that engulfs the lives of many Americans, her work offers a compelling portrait of life for many.

**"I think breaking away is damn near impossible...It's the hardest thing I ever did."**

Inspired by children's entertainment television, horror film and psychological trauma, Jen Clay's work purposefully bemuses. She uses elaborate, evolving costumes to create a nightmarish world of colorful, emotive and sympathetic characters that are able to discuss difficult subjects via performance, video and animation.



### LORI NIX

Lori Nix creates her scenes from small tabletop dioramas with exacting attention to detail and scale. In "Beauty Shop", she's created a world obliterated and ravaged by some unspoken yet cataclysmic event. The beauty salon, a space dedicated to perfecting the image of feminine appeal, is shown now dishevelled, messy, dirty and showing its age.



### LISA ROCKFORD

**"I used images from my own and my mother's bodies as source material. I began by photographing Spider veins (Telangiectasia) in the surface of my legs, (and later my mother's legs) with an endoscopic camera, which magnifies by 100 times. When I examined these colorful scars more closely, I was mystified by the inherent colors and the intricacies of these unique capillary formations. I began to find beauty in what would usually be considered the 'repulsive defects' of my own abundant."**



### SANDRA SCOLNIK

Sandra Scolnik's intimate paintings share a dark, surreal and lonely narrative. Her haunting scenes distort and deform her characters – mostly self portraits – and bring to life a dreamy, theatrical confrontation of life and death, spiraling into existential crisis and psychotherapeutic introspection. Following the thread of historic Surrealist painters Frida Khalo and Leonora Carrington, her work echoes themes of isolation, mental trauma and fantasy.



### AMALIA CAPUTO

Amalia Caputo, an artist and art historian, creates work in photography, video and collaboration that explore the facets of femininity in a contemporary and globally connected world. Pulled from a video of the same name, "La casa (de Hestia)" shows a woman in pink dragging a miniature pink home across the wet sand, gathering resistance with each step, tethered to each other by a tangle of ropes and knots. The tension of the woman's struggle to free herself from the pink model home as it continues to dig deeper into the wet ground as she pulls is rife with allegory. The title itself refers to the Greek goddess Hestia, a virginal goddess of hearth, family and domesticity.



### JO ANN WALTERS

Jo Ann Walters began the "Vanity and Consolation" series in the mid-1980s after receiving a Guggenheim Fellowship to photograph the Mississippi River, from its source in the Minnesota to the banks along the Gulf of Mexico.

**"My travels became the impetus for a journey inward that resulted in more than a decade of self-exploration as I photographed young women, girls and children. Each in their own right became a surrogate charged with questions of possibility, paths not taken, lives un-lived or forgotten."**



### SIMONE SHUBUCK

Simone Shubuck's illustrative work involves delicate doodles, soft shades of pinks and greens and an endearing confusion of figurations and abstraction. Inspired by a previous gig as a florist, blooms, vines and floral design grow rapidly through her drawings and books.

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**MEL KADEL**

Mel Kadel's playful young ingenues traverse her mixed media drawings and collage to take on adventurous and allegorical explorations. In "Bubble gum stick", a young girl in a patchwork dress is trapped, each hand a foot stuck to the ground by thick wads of chewed up bubblegum. The character seems determined to cross our page, but at least for the moment, frozen and held back by the sweet, familiar smell of bubblegum.



**AMY MAHNICK**

In her colorful and abstracted still life paintings, Amy Mahnick blends familiar forms with unfamiliar shapes eliciting a Cubist mode of perception with the objects of mass production we consume and fill our lives with.

"... the act of painting itself is a communion of sorts rather than a detached observation for me. There's a very direct, mutual dependency between the props and I, that's established through my line of sight, where they become animated and reveal something through their contours and gestures etc. and in return give me something to respond to."

**"When I'm shaping the plastic into sculptures what I think I'm trying to do is infuse organic life into them. I want to break down the resiliency of their machine-made forms. But that's the big picture . . ."**



**LISA SANDITZ**

Lisa Sanditz is best known for her whimsical paintings that depict an uncanny and quizzical eye on Americana. The cloud of thick, juicy pink that oozes out from the rather classical depiction of a large American factory is Pink Slime, the euphemistic term for a meat-based product used as a food additive to beef-based processed meats.


